aving the opportunity to have my say here is really exciting for me! I'm always talking about how I want every day to be a takeover day for young people at Scouts, so it's brilliantly fitting that I get the chance to take over from Wayne for our takeover issue.

When I first started Scouting, I remember feeling like I had to keep it really quiet. When I went to Kenya to complete my Explorer Belt and put a photo on Facebook of a giraffe licking my face, a lot of people said, 'That's incredible! So, from me and from all of the young people you inspire, push and support every day, it's a massive thank you.



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

# **NEWS**IN BRIEF



## AND THE RESULTS ARE IN...

Feedback from the members' survey is now available. An online and printed survey was previously released and all members were asked to take part. The survey explores members' attitudes to Scouting and how you feel about certain aspects of your volunteering. One of the key purposes of the survey was to track how empowered, valued and proud volunteers feel as we work towards our 2018 Vision. More than 5,300 volunteers filled out the survey and feedback suggests that key areas of the Vision resonate with members. When asked to pick the top three priorities for the focus of HQ work, a key element of our inclusivity aims was highlighted: 27% of respondents listed 'Helping grow Scouting across the UK in deprived areas' as a top priority.

Ninety-seven percent of volunteers also feel that they make an impact on the lives of young people and 95% are proud to tell people that they volunteer for the Scouts. Both of these figures are higher than last year.

Ninety-one percent would recommend volunteering with Scouting to family and friends – an increase of 4% on last year's results. Check out the full summary of the results at scouts.org.uk/2018resources.

You can find your membership number on your appointment card or you can ask your local managers/ administrators/appointment secretary. Your log-in details used for the old system will no longer work. Register now by heading to the Members area of scouts.org.uk and click on the Compass button in the top right corner.

#### Getting your youth members on Compass

Now that all of the adult members in Scouting have had access to Compass

for a couple of months, the focus has been on ensuring that all of our youth members are loaded onto the system too. Many of you will have been busy loading all of the young people in your section, Group, District and County/ Area/Region into Compass over the last month or so. Don't forget to take a look at the user guides available on **scouts.org.uk/compass** to help you make a start using these tools. Thank you for taking the time to complete this task.

#### **Support for using Compass**

team can come back to you with more information to help your query. The Scout Information Centre is always on hand to help with your questions too.

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



hey call Muirne 'the brains' of the Group and after speaking to her for just a couple of minutes, you can see why. She's sharp, focused and passionate about academia. Muirne talks about her upcoming GCSEs with enthusiasm, then goes on to explain her plan to tackle A-levels, university and finally a career as a field medic. She's ambitious, confident and passionate about helping others: she's a Scout through and through.

Muirne is part of an incredible

team of Young Leaders at 1st Abbotswood in Yate, Bristol. There are four of them in total; as well as Muirne, there's Dom — a natural leader: calm, collected and always keen to help the younger Scouts with whatever problem they bring to him. Reece is the practical one; a mechanic in the making with a cheeky sense of humour. And then there's the final member of the team: 'Georgia? Georgia does whatever she wants!' laughs Reece.

In actual fact, Georgia is the 'mother' of the group; a problem-

solver who has a head for funds and a heart for helping in any way she can. Together they form an amazing leadership team that has changed the lives of every young person that has come through the door at 1st Abbotswood and they have contributed to growing numbers and greater stability – not bad for a leadership team that hasn't even left school yet.

#### The fantastic four

'The four of them are very different,' says Georgina Hudd, Scout Leader. 'They were like this going through all sections – Patrol Leaders then Troop Leaders. They've always loved learning and leading as opposed to just doing the activities – that's the kind of people they are.'

With the help and amazing support from Georgina, Muirne, Georgia, Reece and Dom have done fantastic things for the Group. They organise events and activities, organise and plan meetings, take care of funds and work on the Group's social media and website. They also organise activities and events for the Scouts.

But as well as being great organisers, the Young Leaders are even greater with the younger Scouts

feel comfortable; therefore the young Scouts feel comfortable.'

The Young Leaders help the Cubs and Scouts with their homework and chat about school projects at camp. They talk about GCSEs and exams and moving to different school years and classes and they give advice to those that worry and who might struggle with school.

'One girl struggled particularly with confidence at school,' remembers Georgina. 'But having Muirne there, even just seeing her around school helped considerably. That girl now has loads of friends and is doing brilliantly.'

#### **Selfless heroes**

'This Group has helped me a lot and I wanted to give something back,' says Dom.

It's clear that these guys love

Scouts and they all see how important it is to young people; they also understand how

vital it is to mentor and help others.

'I'm a senior student at school — which is basically being a mentor' says Georgia. 'When I started school they didn't have the scheme so I didn't have access to an older kid to go to with any questions or to get advice. There were teachers, but having people my age helped a lot.'

With their own exams looming in the near distance and study taking up a lot of their time, these guys are more than familiar with the pressures of school and Scouts offers a respite from that world.

'Scouts gives people the chance to be themselves and it's brilliant to be part of it,' says Dom. 'Everyone goes through tough times and it shouldn't have to be that tough. School is difficult enough already so I want to help make life easier for young people. Scouts is an escape; it also

reveals who you are. It's an amazing feeling; helping others is the best feeling I've had.'

#### Doing things differently

Considering the passion for leadership and helping others these Young Leaders have, it's no surprise that they took an alternative approach; instead of joining Explorer Groups elsewhere, they decided to stick together at 1st Abbotswood and register as a Young Leader Unit.

'It's a fairly new concept,' says Georgina. 'You can be an Explorer and a Young Leader but these guys didn't want to do that - they wanted to go straight to the leadership roles and focus on that. Many people in the District weren't sure about this and asked why they just didn't go to Explorers, but these guys are happy; it means they go straight to supporter roles, which is what they like doing.'

The Young Leader team at 1st Abbotswood shows Scouting at its very best - youth-shaped and putting young people in the driving seat; allowing them to carve out their own adventure no matter what.

'As a society we're prone to taking

away young people's choices but we try not to do that at Scouts,' says Georgina. 'If these are the type of young people that take joy from giving back to others, then so be it. The YL scheme isn't for everyone some of it is hard and you have to be the right kind of person. These guys are mature for their age and they want the responsibility at that age and it works for them.'

It's hard to argue with this, especially when you talk to Muirne, Dom, Reece and Georgia, who clearly couldn't be happier. 'I like being here and I really like being a leader,' says Reece. 'I enjoy it too much to leave.'

#### **Making their mark**

The Young Leaders have already finished their Young Leader training - and in record time. 'They'll probably take different roles going forward,' says Georgina. 'Dom will

gravitate to Cubs and run the Group. Reece will probably join Dom and Muirne loves the paperwork - so she'll probably go for Chair or Group Scout Leader, knowing her – always aiming for the top. Georgia will probably go with Scouts, which is her favourite section to work with.'

Beyond that – who knows; but whatever happens, this group will have truly made their mark at 1st Abbotswood and changed the lives of countless young people in the process... 9

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

Hannah's career in Scouts began 11 years ago when her next-door neighbour took her to a Scout meeting. She then had a taste of leadership when the leaders on her first camp allowed her and her fellow Scouts to take turns navigating their minibus. 'I remember thinking "I am leading the whole Troop!" and it just felt so amazing! It was just a really simple way to share responsibility.'

Fast forward a few years to Hannah age 15 and you'll see her standing in front of her County Commissioner, without knowing who he was, and asking for support for a Monopoly Run she was organising. 'Half an hour later he stood up to speak and I was so embarrassed. He said something like "I had a young person approach me today and one day I think she'll end up taking my job." Someone saying that sticks with you.'

Hannah's County Commissioner's belief in her – as well as her belief in herself – has clearly given her the courage to reach for the skies. She says that she would like to become a Chief Executive in the charity sector. 'If you ask me on a different day I'll have a new dream. At the moment I like the idea of being the Chief Executive of a charity. I reckon I could do Matt's job (Matt Hyde, CEO of The Scout Association)! The way I look at it, if I can already be where I am now, then I could well be running a charity in 10-15 years' time.'







# 'Scouting gave me confidence'

Deputy UK Youth Commissioner Jagz is currently studying in north London and credits Scouting for helping him get there. 'I think Scouts has given me the confidence to be independent no matter where I am.'


## 'I was so pleased when I won gold'



Three Scout Leaders were challenged to drive an ultra low-emission car for three months to see what a difference it made to their lives...



hen Go Ultra Low,
a government
campaign to
promote Ultra
Low-Emission
Vehicles (ULEVs), offered three of
our Scout Leaders the chance to test
drive its cars for three months, they
jumped at the chance.

A few months on and Pete, Simon



and David have been travelling to and from their Scout meetings in their ULEVs: the 100% electric Renault ZOE and Nissan LEAF, and the Toyota Prius Plug-in Hybrid, a combination of an electric motor and an internal combustion engine.


#### How they got on

The leaders took great delight in all the wonderful features of their ULEVs. From David being able to find his nearest chargepoint using his Renault ZOE's sat nav, to Pete being able to pre-heat his Nissan LEAF on cold mornings using a smartphone

app, these cars are one step ahead of the rest. Not only can ultra low emission cars cost as little as 2p a mile, but they also calculate your energy use against your speed and tell you how far you can travel before recharging.

Each leader had a chargepoint fitted at their home, but they were also impressed at the number of chargepoints available around the







country, many of which are free to use, helping Simon in particular to halve his fuel costs compared to his regular petrol car.

All three found the electric cars were a talking point, receiving interest from Scouts, colleagues and friends, all of whom wanted to be taken for a spin. Even strangers would approach them to ask questions. In particular, Pete's Scout Group were fascinated by his new ULEV. One Scout said, 'I really like it but there doesn't seem to be anything propelling it!'

Pete also introduced his Group to the new resources from Go Ultra

# WHY SHOULD YOU GO ULTRA LOW?

The UK Government has committed to reducing the UK's greenhouse gas emissions by at least 80% by 2050, the aim being that in 2050 almost every car and van in the UK will be a Go Ultra Low vehicle. The UK Government is making it easier to switch to a ULEV with Plug-in Car Grants, offering up to £5,000 towards the cost, and by installing rapid chargepoints around the country that can charge a car in as little as 20 minutes

ULEVs don't just help with environmental savings; it is estimated that parents make 1.3 billion journeys over school year. Go Ultra Low estimates that 410 million litres of fuel\* will be needed to power these pick-ups and drop-offs, at a total cost of £530m. # ALASKAN ADVENTURE

One Explorer Scout Leader embarks on a different kind of journey...

ou may have heard of
Barrow, Alaska...
It's the desolate setting
for the horror film (and
novel), 30 Days of Night.
It's also the place Karl Pilkington
visited during his An Idiot Abroad
escapades, commenting that it
wouldn't matter if you went blind in
Barrow 'because there's nothing to
see there anyway'. There are no roads

that lead to Barrow; only planes and boats can access it.

A small town at the most northern point of Alaska, Barrow is plunged into darkness for a couple of months straight every year (the perfect place for vampires in the aforementioned film and book!). It's a bleak place and almost certainly it wouldn't be your first choice for a holiday destination.

But for one intrepid Explorer

Scout Leader from Swansea, Barrow is the place – for now at least – that he calls home.

#### It's grim up north

'It looks like a post-apocalyptic wasteland; full of dusty corrugated-iron sheds and warehouses and a patchwork of wind-blasted wooden houses. Forget the mountains and glaciers you picture of Alaska; Barrow is extremely flat. On a clear day you can see for hundreds of miles in all directions.'

Meet Owen Hayman: 23 and an Assistant Explorer Scout Leader from Sheffield whose Scout spirit and hunger for adventure has brought him to Northern Alaska.

Though it's not the most glamorous place for an explorer, there's a reason Owen has flown out to this remote location — he's here on serious business. Owen is a field technician intern, working on collecting information for Sheffield University and San Diego State University as part of a long-term project. 'Our research in Barrow tells us if the tundra up here is absorbing or releasing carbon dioxide and methane, both of which are greenhouse gases.'

With a trend of arctic warming,

greenhouse gas release from the tundra could cause even more warming and climate change, with disastrous global consequences; the research team have field sites across the entire North Slope of Alaska.

Living and working in a remote corner of the world in -40° conditions is the kind of situation Owen is used to. He has adventure flowing through his veins and he's been exploring the world and seeking excitement since he got his first taste of Scouting: 'I've worked on Scout camps in Washington State, an international camp in Arkansas and volunteered in Sweden,' says Owen.

#### **Spirit of adventure**

Owen has been a Scout since he was six, joining 44th Swansea Scouts as a Beaver; he's now AESU with Anvil Explorer Unit in Sheffield. 'We're based within a short distance of both Sheffield city centre and the

Peak District,' says Owen. 'We enjoy everything from caving to city-wide Pac-Man wide-games.' He continues: 'Scouting gave me an appreciation for the spirit of adventure and a hunger to explore further afield.'

So it's no surprise that Owen ended up getting an intern role that takes him to the far corners of the

earth – to environments as unique as Barrow. 'Without a doubt, Scouting was key in helping me identify my strengths and finding ways to work with my weaknesses. Outdoors work and an interest in the environment were fostered in Scouting, so in life I've naturally headed toward jobs where I can put these skills to use.'







A typical working day in Barrow usually consists of your usual 9–5 structure, despite the lack of sunlight. Owen starts the day with porridge and tea before checking the weather and the data coming in from the team's instruments in the field. He then drives out to the laboratory and warehouse to collect equipment and tools and then returns to get dressed for the cold conditions.

'While staying warm is essential, sweating into the clothes and boots is a dangerous mistake to make,' says Owen. 'The sweat makes your clothes damp and takes heat away from the body quickly.'

Tasks out in the field might include collecting data, such as ice depth within the soil, to cleaning and calibrating instruments that permanently collect data. 'This may last the whole day, with lunch being eaten in a small shed out on the tundra,' says Owen. 'We round things up with any indoor work and data handling and then I will see out the rest of the day by watching the sea ice on the beach in the

summer or looking for northern lights in the winter.'

#### All work and no play?

Of course, Owen's Barrow experience isn't entirely work-focused: 'During the mid-summer there were many other researchers here from all over the world – as many as 50 – we'd have bonfires on the beach.

Quad-biking, coastal walks and exploration and bird-watching all feature in Owen's day-to-day routine, as does getting involved in cultural events like local dances and meeting local Scouts. 'There's a Boy Scout Troop here in Barrow,' says Owen. 'During the winter the Scouts build an igloo and sleep in it. During summer they may camp locally but usually fly to central Alaska to Lost Lake Scout Camp to meet Scouts from other parts of Alaska.'

Owen will spend five-and-a-half months in Barrow; adventuring and studying with other researchers and enjoying a fairly surreal way of life.

He's come a long way since lighting his first campfire as a Beaver Scout

and enjoying a memorable meal of toast and marmalade. These are the earliest memories of adventure for Owen and it's definitely Scouting that started him out on the path to an amazing journey.


'I remember bonding with Scouts from all over the world around the campfire at Gilwell Park and getting on a plane to go to the USA when I was 19 to work at a Scout camp,' says Owen. 'It was the first time I'd been on a plane. I was alone but I knew I had the best summer of my life ahead of me and this was just the beginning of my adventures!'

#### THE CHEF



## How can adults help you stay safe online?

'Talk to us; engage us; show an interest in what we're doing. Young Leaders would be perfect for something like this – you could ask them to run an evening on online games or something similar. Staying safe online would obviously feature heavily, but if you keep the focus on fun, we're much more likely to remember what you tell us.'

uberty is a critical phase in any young person's life as it is the time when they are faced with huge social, physical and psychological

change. The type of support you offer at this time can make or break a young person, so it's crucial to take the correct approach. The right support means being well informed, allowing that young person to have a voice, while at the same time giving them a sense of security and support should they need it.

#### What's going on

Puberty is the time when changes in hormone levels trigger the development of male and female sex characteristics.

On average girls start puberty between 8—14 years and boys start between 9—14 years of age. Most changes occur within an average of four years of these changes starting.

Puberty can ignite new impulses and motivations, driving emotions and thought processes. The most important thing you can do to is normalise their environment while these changes take place, removing additional challenges and stresses. Let it be known just how common it is to feel this way and how they are not alone. Letting peers chat to each other is a great help and can really help bonding within a group. Being among friends they can trust and who won't judge them is vital.

#### Teen changes

- Physical changes including increase in penis size in boys, development of breasts and the start of periods in girls, and growth spurts in both, as well as acne and changes in body odour.
- Psychological changes often causing self-consciousness, irritability and changes in mood.
- Behavioural changes sometimes causing teenagers to experiment with smoking, alcohol, drugs and sex.

Here are five changes your Scouts may experience, and how you can help them cope with them:

#### Physical changes

Lots of teenagers are quite shocked when they see changes in their bodies. The best way to help them is to provide a safe and secure environment where Scouts can truly be themselves without feeling even more self-conscious or under scrutiny. Remember to respect a young person's right to privacy and always bear in mind the code of behaviour, which can be found at tinyurl. com/lrywynt. You can also make sure you have a selection of relevant leaflets available for further information.

physical changes they experience can accentuate differences between them and others. Young people are trying to carve out an identity for themselves, but they are also trying to balance that with being accepted and not being marked as too different from the crowd. At this stage, approval from peers is more important than approval from adults. Be open to signs of bullying, changes in character or individuals becoming more silent or aggressive. Be aware of different groups forming and the dynamics of these groups. The key is to be open and to inspire confidence in your young people. Talking in a general session about bullying can help as well as giving them information about places of confidential

## Self esteem and developmental insecurity

Self-esteem can be a real challenge and can be focused on body-image issues, confidence in themselves, social groups and friends or relationships. It affects each young person in a different way, for example in public speaking, academic success or appearance.

You can help by becoming aware of the specific patterns for each young person and focus on helping them with a cognitive behavioural approach. Try to intervene in small ways by challenging thoughts and resulting emotions in that young person. You can take it further by suggesting thought re-balancing exercises that can be fun and simple.

Mindfulness and self-awareness techniques are also really useful for them to try at home or you can direct them to another source of help. ## Relationships, sexuality and gender identity

Young people will start having feelings and thoughts about relationships and sex at this age. Leaders should ensure that their young people have the knowledge they need to make informed decisions. You can make them aware of the various services available to them, including sexual health services and local GPs, and if you're approached about contraception, you should try to provide the relevant information. Many of the situations Scout Leaders may come across can be found in the FAQ section of the Promoting Good Sexual Health within Scouting factsheet, or at fpa.org. uk and brook.org.uk.

#### Bullying

Bullying tends to occur more frequently when young people hit puberty, as the

#### Peer pressure

Young people are often affected by peer pressure because they are still forming their own set of rules and ideals. This can manifest in experimentation with alcohol, smoking or other drugs, as well as relationships and sexual behaviour. You can help by discussing the importance of developing their own individual ideas about how they want to behave. Try then comparing this to a different person's principles to see if they can see the difference, and how this makes them feel. Make it more general to avoid it sounding like a lecture. 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This is very much an up and down 'roller-coastal' walk, providing a good stretch for the legs. Start at the little coastal village of Seatown directly south from Chideock off the A35. You'll find a car park opposite the Anchor pub.

#### The route

Walk back up the road for 200 metres before turning left **(A)** onto the footpath that takes you across a field and a small copse of pines. From here it's an open cliff-top route, steadily ascending towards Golden Cap. The last push **(B)** is steep but cut steps allow for a slow, steady plod uphill. It's worth the effort for the spectacular views of coastline from Portland Bill to the east all the way across to Devon in the west.

A short right-hand detour off the coastal path **(C)** takes you to the ruins of St Gabriel's chapel, once part of a medieval hamlet. Heading back to the coast path there is a permissive route down to the shore at St Gabriel's Mouth

**(D)**. It's a good place for fossils but it's reached via a steep flight of wooden steps and can be especially slippery in wet weather.

Back on the coast path proper (follow the acorn symbols), the next section **(E)** is more gently undulating with the sea views on the left accompanied on the right by a patchwork quilt of green pastures stitched together with a thick thread of dark hedges. Keep your eyes peeled here among golden gorse and wind-sculpted hawthorn bushes for stonechats, or even the rare Dartford warbler. Listen out too for the harsh 'kronk' of ravens as they para-glide along the cliff edge.

The last section of the walk is diverted, due to a recent landslide, but an alternative route is well sign-posted. Turn right, away from the coast, into a National Trust car park **(F)** (Stonebarrow Hill) and then immediately left along a single-track lane which leads (downhill all the way!) to the centre of

Charmouth. Turn left past Seadown Holiday Park then follow a footpath which takes you directly to the beach.

This is the perfect place to hunt for fossils as 185 million years of prehistoric life is gradually exposed from the eroding rocks. Try to time a trip for just after high tide, leaving plentiful hours to scour the shingle for fossil shells especially tiny ammonites and even shark's teeth that have been exposed by the receding sea. It's simply a question of wandering with your eyes glued to the beach at your feet – maybe turning over a rock or two. Once your eye is 'in' you'll soon have a trove of fossil treasures.


#### **Getting back**

There are two bus services from Charmouth Church, the X53 from Exeter to Poole and the 31 between Axminster and Weymouth, which run east along the A35 to Chideock Bridge. From here it's a mile walk back to Seatown itself.

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

Eight-year-old Dylan wrote a recipe book to raise money for the Wallace and Gromit Children's Charity. Here, he shares one of his tasty recipes with us

This recipe is a good use of leftover roast chicken. If you wanted you could make a vegetarian cheeky leeky pie by just using more seasonal vegetables rather than the chicken and ham, and replace the chicken stock with vegetable stock.

#### **Ingredients**

#### Serves 4

- Plain flour 50g
- Unsalted butter 50g
- Seasoning (salt and pepper)
- Cold water
- Knob of butter for leeks
- Large leeks 2, washed, trimmed and chopped into chunks
- Plain flour 1 tbsp (for sauce)
- Semi-skimmed milk 300ml
- Chicken stock up to 100ml
- Leftover roast chicken
- Ham 2 slices, cut into chunks
- Egg 1 small, beaten (optional)

Turn the oven on to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6.

Put the flour, 50g unsalted butter, and seasoning into a mixing bowl and rub the butter in until the mixture is like breadcrumbs. Add enough cold water into the breadcrumbs mixture and stir until it becomes doughy. You can add more cold water if necessary to make it less dry. Wrap the dough in cling film and put in the fridge for 30 minutes.

Melt a knob of butter over a low heat and add the chunks

of leek. Stir and soften for 5 minutes.

Add in 1 tbsp of plain flour to the leeks and mix well, then add the milk a little at a time, stirring all the time until the sauce thickens, then add enough chicken stock to make the consistency you like.

Add the roast chicken pieces and the ham into the white sauce, season, and tip the whole mixture into an ovenproof dish and leave to cool.

6 Roll out the pastry to make a cover

for the pie dish. Lift the pastry over the dish, making sure it goes over the edges, and press down all around.
Make a hole in the middle with a knife and brush all over with beaten egg if you wish.

Pake in the oven for 25 minutes until the pastry is golden brown.

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## MUNA HASSAN

The inspirational young activist tells us about her campaign and how your Scouts can also strive for change

## How did you begin your campaign?

I started campaigning against female genital mutilation (FGM) at the age of 14. I'd never heard of it before, but just seeing the UN definition of FGM told me all I needed to know: it was a horrible practice and it was our duty as human beings to do something. At the time we were four girls working with an organisation called Integrate Bristol. Our first project was to write a piece of poetry about FGM. We were young, but incredibly passionate and we all believed that in order to make a change we had to speak out.

## Where did you find the courage to strive for change?

For me, it was knowing that 2,000 girls were at risk of the practice in Bristol and no one was speaking out. It was all about them.

## What support did you have in your actions?

We had incredible amount of support from our families and friends. Our project manager, Lisa Zimmermann was amazing; she gave us a platform on which we could say exactly how we felt, which for us was really difficult to find, especially on a subject like FGM. Local organisations and politicians have also been amazing and to have people who are just as passionate as we are around us really helps.

## What has the response been to your efforts so far?

We've had some incredible response to our work. One of our earlier projects, Silent Scream, won Young Voice of the year 2012. I was also awarded young person of the year 2013 at the Sexual Health UK ceremony, which was a complete honour. I think what always gets to me, is seeing younger girls and boys being able to talk about FGM without feeling any form of stigma being attached to the subject. Knowing the next generation is just as passionate if not more, inspires me every day.

## How can Scouts make a real difference?

Scouting can give young people the confidence to speak about issues important to them. That's where true change comes from – young people trying to make the world a better place for themselves and future generations. It's important for them to have a voice because they are our future politicians, doctors, teachers, nurses, and most importantly, the next generation of parents. Young people can change the world if they want to – they just need to be heard.
